



ALBERTA (AB) HERDING DOG RESCUE ADOPTION APPLICATION

PLEASE READ FIRST....

We are not a shelter, nor do we have a public facility, with regular store hours where potential adopters can drop in at any time and go home with a dog of their choice. All of our animals are fostered in private homes, allowing us to properly assess their temperament and behaviour to better understand the type of family that will best suit the dog's needs. Potential adopters will be put in touch with the foster home if they would like more details on a particular dog, and/or would like to arrange a visit before starting the process, but the foster home cannot release the dog until the application has received final approval.

We will consider long-distance adoptions however, we would first recommend checking the two websites below for rescue organizations, or dogs in need of homes, in your area. Both websites are a good place to start if a flight or road trip is prohibitive to adopting one of our dogs.

Please note that many of these herding breeds are pets that were owner surrendered to us because they either exhibit

1. excessive herding behaviours that many pet owners do not know how to deal with or
2. no herding behaviours that the stockmen & ranchers are looking for or
3. high intensity & drive that require an appropriate outlet, such as dog sports.

We rarely get a "couch potato" that is happy to just sit in the yard and watch the world go by. It is even rarer that we get puppies (< 1 yr old) - it is more likely that we will get a dog that was found as a stray, was chasing livestock and was in danger of being shot, was nipping the kids, is somewhat fearful of specific types of people, would shut down when worked on livestock, excessive barking, resource guarding issues or some other obsessive behaviour often manifesting into a bigger problem than the owners were able or willing to deal with. We also get dogs transferred from shelters because these breeds do not do very well in a shelter environment and thus, they do not show well at all to potential adopters. The longer they stay in a shelter, the greater the chance they may develop other unwanted behaviours due to the noise and higher states of arousal/stimulation and the less chance they have of being adopted.

Our job, first and foremost, is to help these dogs learn how to be good pets so that the general breed-knowledgeable public can adopt them and live with them. We do not expect every adopter to want to do dog sports or get involved in herding but we do expect that adopters realize that these dogs need regular physical and mental exercise to keep them happy and be easier to live with. This is often much more than most other breeds need but even so, a herding dog should also know when to work and when to relax and be able to co-exist politely in the house with the owner. Herding breeds do NOT make the best family pets, though. Children can move funny, unpredictably and often fast, which may seem chaotic to the herding dog who was bred to control and bring together the scattered livestock. If you think getting one of these breeds will be "good for the kids" or "will make a good friend for a current dog" or will "just hang out in an un-fenced yard while you are doing something else", we ask you to reconsider the breed you are looking for. A herding breed may not be the best choice.

We are looking for active pet homes that are engaged with their dogs regularly or for working/herding homes that know how to train them for the job they need and who have a safe place for them when they are not working. Hopefully you will understand that our animals' best interests are at the heart of what we do and our **ultimate goal** is to find perfect matches! We do not have an adoption quota or a timeline to meet. To that end, we will process applications for the same dog in the order we receive them but it is the **best match** (NOT 1st come, 1st served) that will get the initial approval. If, after the 30 day trial period, the dog is not the perfect match, the dog must be returned to AB Herding Dog Rescue at the adopter's expense. At that point, we will revisit any other applications received for that dog.

Having said that, if you are sure that one of our foster dogs is the perfect match for you, then please follow the steps outlined below. We require that potential adopters travel to meet our dogs as we will not ship them to places or people unknown. We will make every effort to have all stages of the process done before a trip is made so that if the Meet'n'Greet goes well, the dog can go home with you on the same day. It is important to note that the greater the distance, the longer the process may take as we will need to find and contact volunteers local to your area for home visits. If we are unable to find local volunteers, we will consider virtual home visits if technology will allow us.

OUR ADOPTION PROCESS

- Fill it out this application as completely as possible, sign and email it back to swineyc@xplornet.ca.
 - Please **include 3 written references**, or have your references email swineyc@xplornet.ca directly with information that will support your application.
 - Please have them include what they know about your life style, your knowledge of the breed(s) & training methods (if possible), as well as the general wellbeing of any current pets.
 - Simply saying that you would make good pet owners does not tell us enough.
 - *Including or emailing written references will greatly speed up the process.*
 - You can snail mail it to the address on the last page, although this would likely be less reliable and take longer. ***We do NOT have a fax number.***
- If there are any questions or concerns about the application, we will contact you for clarification.
- Once we can line up a volunteer to do the home visit, we will introduce you to them by email so that you can arrange a time convenient to you both. Generally, except during high vacation seasons (summer & Christmas), this step can be done within a week of receiving your application.
- If there are specific requirements for some dogs (for ex: deaf dogs will require a secure, fenced yard), they are there for a reason and the home visit is primarily to ensure us that you can provide what the dogs need and will keep them safe.
- Once the home visit is complete, arrangements are then made with the foster home for a Meet'n'Greet. At that point, if it goes well, the adoption contract is signed and we transfer the dog over to you.
 - Visits with the dogs can be arranged prior to the home visit, to ensure which dog it is that interests you, but they cannot go home with you at that point.
- **Adoption fees are due upon the transfer of the dog to the adopter for the 30 day trial period.**
 - If the adopter requests a delay in the transfer to a date of their convenience, a \$100 deposit is required. The deposit will be forfeit IF the adopter abandons the process prior to the trial adoption period.
 - If, during the 30 day trial adoption period, the dog is not a good match, the entire adoption fee will be returned upon the dog's return to our rescue (or applied to a different dog that may be a better match).
- If, for any reason, the adopter can no longer keep or care for the dog they adopted from us, we will ALWAYS take them back as long as we continue to operate.

NOTE: We operate as a not-for-profit but we cannot help dogs in need if we are operating in the negative. If extensive veterinary care is required, fees may increase to help defray our costs. If one of our dogs has the talent & work ethic to be working livestock, the cost of training that dog will be added to the adoption fee as we have to pay the trainer. AB-HDR reserves the right to waive adoption fees on a case-by-case basis and foster families have always had first right of refusal on adopting their foster dogs, because of all the work they do with them.
